Jae Haeng Choi first felt called to ministry when teaching and counseling high school girls in her hometown. Choi received support for this calling as a Women of Color scholar through the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry. In the program, she received funding to study for a doctorate. Help from mentors was vital for Choi, who grew up in Incheon, Korea.




CREATING NEW PLACES FOR NEW PEOPLE AND RENEWING EXISTING CONGREGATIONS

Living Water United Methodist Church in Pearland, Texas, began in 2005 and a year later had 225 people, but attendance gradually declined to about 70.

"I felt like a failure," said the Rev. Ed Jones.

Jones struggled to understand why people were not attending worship while other area churches were experiencing growth. "We took six months to sort things out, and now we are in a new day." Jones said. "I realized I was not listening daily to the word of God. We were too caught up in building the church and not enough in connecting the disconnected." Attendance moved back up to around 200 people by the time the congregation chartered in 2009. Learn about Path 1. ENGAGING IN MINISTRY WITH THE POOR

In Ann Arbor, Mich., 17-year-old Guatemalan-American Jasmine watched her mother being taken to jail by immigration agents. After her mother was deported, her father and sister soon returned to Guatemala, too. Jasmine was left alone to take care of herself. Jasmine had to work to pay the rent for the trailer and other family bills. Her school social worker notified a local United Methodist church that offered Hispanic/Latino ministries. They soon began to take Jasmine to church, and she joined the praise choir. Jasmine is living with a family from the church and has also started teaching English as a Second Language classes because she wants to give back to the congregation for all they have done for

STAMPING OUT KILLER DISEASES OF POVERTY BY IMPROVING HEALTH GLOBALLY



At age 4, Wilson Marimi contracted malaria-the dreaded disease that causes excruciating headaches, severe diarrhea, high fevers and joint pain, and claims the life of a child every 30 seconds on the continent of Africa. By age 5, he would walk 20 miles to the nearest dispensary in Kenya to receive treatment.

Through treatment, Wilson is healthy and productive and is currently working on his Ph.D. degree.

"This disease can be prevented," Wilson said. "With the gifts God has given us, with the love God has given us, we can make a small sacrifice to save one more life. It is something that goes eternally. It's an eternal action. It is really a shame that in the 21st century, people are dying [from malaria]. There are ways they can be taught to overcome this killer disease."

Not everyone who contracts the disease dies. The fortunate ones get adequate care in time to survive. Thus, The United Methodist Church supports the Global Health Initiative's campaign Imagine No Malaria. Learn more about what the church is doing to improve health globally at www.umcom.org.
