When the apostle Paul wrote to his friend and associate Titus, he outlined the qualifications and expected behavior of bishops:

"It's important that a church leader, responsible for the affairs in God's house, be looked up to [Bishops] must welcome people, be helpful, wise, fair, reverent, . . . and have a good grip on the Message, knowing how to use the truth to either spur people on in knowledge or stop them in their tracks if they oppose it." --Titus 1:7-9. The Message

Indeed, bishops are an integral part of the spiritual and administrative leadership of The United Methodist Church. We elect bishops to speak to—and from—the church.

The Episcopal Fund, one of United Methodism's seven apportioned funds, pays our bishops' salaries, covers their office and travel expenses, and provides their pension and health-benefit coverage.

The 2008 General Conference approved Four Areas of Focus to guide the denomination's work. Already these areas are transforming the denomination and the world, and our bishops as global church spokespersons are leading by example.

The four areas—developing principled Christian leaders, creating new churches and renewing existing ones, engaging in ministries with the poor and stamping out killer diseases of poverty by improving global health—"are moving the church into the urgent work that Jesus wants us to do," said Louisville Area Bishop Lindsey Davis. Such ministries "fill us with hope."

Pittsburgh Area Bishop Thomas Bickerton called them "the tie that binds all of us together, reconnects us to our Wesleyan DNA and once again opens us to God's will."
