IN MEMORIAM

Rev. Alejo Hernández

At the 13th Session of the West Texas Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church South, held at Leesburg, TX, Alejo Hernández was ordained Deacon by Bishop Enoch Marvin on December 24, 1871. He was the first person of Mexican descent ordained by the Methodists.

His first appointment was to the Mexican Mission in Corpus Christi. Rev. John Wesley DeVilbiss was the presiding Elder.

In 1873, with Bishop John C. Keener, Alejo organized the first Methodist congregation in Mexico City. He is father to Methodism in Texas and Mexico.

On the night of September 27, 1875 he died in Corpus Christi and is buried there. Bishop Keener said of Alejo: "How full must have been the flood of the holy passion in the soul of this young man to diffuse itself throughout our church in such a short time."

WHY WE CELEBRATE TODAY

Dr. Alfredo Náñez, one of the most distinguished pastors of the Río Grande Conference, delivered several lectures during the 1971 Annual Conference in Corpus Christi. It was the centennial year of Rev. Alejo Hernández's Ordination. A number of those present today were privileged to be present on that occasion.

Dr. Náñez begins his lectures with the question: Why have we come to this place? He answers the question with four responses:

- 1. We are gathered to remember and give thanks for our spiritual heritage and for those who bequeathed it to us.
- 2. Secondly, we gather to celebrate.
- 3. Thirdly, we gather to exercise our faith.
- 4. Finally, we have come to this place to offer ourselves unconditionally and totally to our Lord.

We could not improve on Dr. Náñez's reasons for our gathering in this place 135 years after Alejo Hernández's ordination.

This is holy, consecrated ground. It is the site of a new beginning in the church's mission. It is where a young man unconditionally and fully offered his life to the service of Christ. Here the church voted, the bishop laid hands and the Holy Spirit ordained Alejo into itinerant service in God's universal church through the Methodist Episcopal Church South.

I invite you to remember and give thanks; to sing with joy and pray with open hearts. Finally, give yourself anew to the service of God in Jesus Christ.

Alejo Hernández wrote about his experience of the Spirit during a service in a small church in Brownsville:

I was seated where I could see the congregation but few could see me. I felt that God's Spirit was there. Although I could not understand a word that was being said, I felt my heart strangely warmed. Never did I hear an organ play so sweetly, never did human voices sound so lovely to me, never did people look so beautiful as on that occasion. I went away weeping for joy.

May we leave here today "weeping for joy" at the mighty work of grace in Alejo and in us!

Today, the 16th of December in the year of our Lord 2006, we gather as people of the Wesleyan Heritage to remember the Ordination of Rev. Alejo Hernández as a deacon in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

This year, the 135th since Alejo Hernández's ordination at the 13th session of the West Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, on December 24, 1871, we return to Leesville at the very site where the Leesburg Methodist Church hosted the 1871 Annual Conference.

In memory and with thanksgiving for the life and ministry of the Rev. Alejo Hernández, we present this memorial marker to be dedicated to the glory of God. This marker will remind us, and future generations, of the beginnings of the Methodist witness among the Mexican and Mexican-American communities of Texas, as well as Mexico, through the preaching and teaching of the gospel in the Spanish language.

NOTES FROM THE MINUTES OF THE 13TH SESSION OF THE WEST TEXAS CONFERENCE, METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH, SOUTH, BISHOP E. M. MARVIN, PRESIDING. LEESBURG, TEXAS

First Day of the Conference, Wednesday, December 20, 1871 "QUES.-ADMISSIONS-Who are admitted on trial?"

Alejo Hernandez is listed with five others. They "were presented, and after consideration they were admitted."

Second Day of the Conference, Thursday, December 21

"QUES 10--What Local Preachers are elected Deacons?"

"HERNANDEZ--The bishop announced to the Conference that he had selected Alejo Hernandez for the Missionary work among the Mexicans; whereupon, in view of the necessities of the work he was elected to Deacon's orders."

Fourth Day of the Conference, Saturday, December 23

"BIBLE CAUSE--The committee on Sunday Schools made their report which was adopted as (C) follows:--

"See Sp. Doc. D. A resolution, requesting of the American Bible Society, grant of Sunday School Bibles & Testaments in the Spanish language, for the use of the mission under the pastoral charge of Alejo Hernandez, was read and adopted."

Fourth Day of the Conference, Sunday, December 24

"ORDINATION OF DEACONS AND ELDERS--After the services on Sabbath morning and afternoon the following persons were ordained:--

"Deacons: Jno. B. Denton; Mark A. Black; P. P. Jones, and Alejo Hernandez." "Elders: Marshall G. Jenkins and James E. Nernor."

Fifth Day of the Conference, Monday, December 25

"Fifth Day--Monday Decr. 25, 9 O'clock A. M."

"FAST DAYS--The 1st Friday in April next was appointed by the Conference, as a day of fasting and prayer for the success of the Mexican Mission of which our Brother Alejo Hernandez is pastor." p. 118

Appointments for the year following this session of the annual conference:

"OUES. 31--Where are the preachers stationed this year?" p. 119

Alejo Hernandez is listed in the appointments under the Corpus Christi District, under the appointment of "Mexican Mission."

Alejo Hernández: A Life of Journeying

Alejo Hernández' life was filled with journeys, both physical and spiritual. In his journeys, he crossed the Mexico-U.S. border many times, crossings which evinced his spiritual journeys. Born into a wealthy family in Aguas Calientes, Mexico, on July 17, 1842, Alejo Hernandez was sent by his parents to school in preparation for the Roman Catholic priesthood. During his first year of studies in college in Aguas Calientes, he rejected his faith and decided against the priesthood. That same year, 1862, the French had invaded Mexico. Without informing his family, he left college to join the Mexican forces in their effort to repel Maximilian and his French army.

After being taken prisoner by the French military, and after much adversity, Hernandez rejoined the Mexican army in northern Mexico. The army retreated to the area of Mier, Tamaulipas, where Hernandez found a book that would lead him in a new journey of faith. The book, Noches con los Romanistas (Evenings with the Romanists), by the Reverend M. Hobart Seymour, translated by Reverend H. B. Pratt, and published by the American Tract Society had most likely been left there by U.S. soldiers when the U.S. army had entered northern Mexico under General Zachary Taylor in 1846. Hernández first expected it would confirm his atheistic and anti-Catholic views. However, with its anti-Catholic rhetoric and frequent scriptural references, the book made him curious about biblically-based Protestant claims. His interest piqued, Hernández crossed the Rio Grande at Camargo, Mexico, near present-day Rio Grande City, in search of a Spanish-language Bible. After he found a Spanish-language Bible and read it, he yearned to learn more about the Protestant faith. A few weeks after reading the Bible for the first time, he arrived at Brownsville, Texas, and entered into a small chapel where a Protestant worship service was underway. Although the worship was in English, the Spanish-speaking Hernández was able to intuit the spirit of the gathering. Reflecting on that conversion experience, he observed:

I was seated where I could see the congregation but few could see me. I felt that God's Spirit was there, although I could not understand a word that was being said, I felt my heart strangely warmed... Never did I hear an organ play so sweetly, never did human voices sound so lovely to me, never did people look so beautiful as on that occasion. I went away weeping for joy.

Shortly after this spiritual awakening, Hernández decided to testify about this new understanding of God in Mexico. Seeing so much evangelistic zeal, a friend from the United States encouraged him to return to Texas and join the Protestant church there. With the church's support, he could then continue his evangelistic work.

Hernández made an important connection with Methodists in Corpus Christi, Texas in the summer of 1870. He met William Headon, a prominent member of First Methodist Church, Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the church's pastor, the Reverend J. W. Brown. The two were very supportive of him and his ministry; Rev. Brown even opened his home to Hernández for two months in 1871. Hernández obtained a license to preach and then spent four months preaching and teaching among the Spanish-speaking in the Medina river area, all the while living with the Reverend John W. DeVilbiss, Presiding Elder of the Corpus Christi district. Having his ministerial vocation confirmed through various preaching missions, Hernández felt the call to ordained ministry. To this end, he accompanied his Methodist friends to the West Texas annual conference in Leesburg, Texas, December 20-25, 1871, with Bishop Enoch M. Marvin presiding.

On the first day of the gathering, Wednesday, December 20, 1871, the annual conference admitted Alejo Hernández and with five others on trial as local preachers. On the second day, the conference took the extraordinary step of electing Hernández to deacon's orders only one day after he had been admitted on trial as a local preacher. The conference minutes state: "The bishop announced to the Conference that he had selected Alejo Hernández for the Missionary work among the Mexicans; whereupon, in view of the necessities of the work he was elected to deacon's orders." To aid Hernández in his work, the conference passed a resolution on Saturday, December 23, requesting that the American Bible Society provide Hernández with Sunday School Bibles and Testaments in Spanish. The conference continued to manifest its enthusiasm for this newly ordained minister on day five of the gathering; it passed a resolution declaring that the first Friday of of April 1872 be observed "as a day of fasting and prayer for the success of the Mexican Mission of which our Brother Alejo Hernández is pastor." On the last day of the conference, the appointments for the conference were distributed. Alejo Hernández was appointed to the new Mexican Mission, located in Laredo. The bishop and the conference had provided Hernández with extraordinary attention during the conference: placing him on the fast track for deacon's ordination, requesting religious literature for his new work among the Spanish-speaking, declaring a fast day to beseech God for Hernández' success, and appointing him to the new Mexican Mission.

Hernández' time in Laredo was short. He left for Monterrey to get married and was delayed for several months, one reason being due to illness in his family and another due to revolution in that region. During that time, he worked closely with a Congregational Mission there. While still in Mexico, he was appointed by the bishop at the session of the West Texas Conference in December, 1872, to the Corpus Christi Mexican Mission.

Hernández returned to Corpus Christi in May 1873 and quickly began his ministry among the Spanish-speaking in Corpus Christi and nearby Rockport. This ministry lasted only about three weeks, as Bishop C. Keener had him reassigned to lead a new congregation in Mexico City. He travelled with Bishop Keener to Mexico City to start the Methodist mission there. While there together, Bishop Keener ordained Hernández an elder in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in Mexico City on February 8, 1874. Hernández' tenure in Mexico City was short, only 18 months, because of a stroke that left him incapacitated. His stroke eventually left him paralyzed, able to move only his hands and head. Lacking the strength to continue his ministry there, he made the long journey back to Corpus Christi by stagecoach and wagon. He was detained in Matamoros for months due to lack of funds and also to be treated by a doctor. He remained there until the last few weeks of his life. He was able to return to Corpus Christi to spend the last few weeks with his wife and two small children and friends until his death on September 27, 1875.

Even though his ministerial career was short, Alejo Hernández laid a foundation for Methodist ministry among Mexicans and Mexican-Americans. Alfredo Náñez reflects on the significance of Alejo Hernández' ministry: "The ministry of Alejo Hernández was very brief. In Texas it consisted of a few months at best and in Mexico a little over a year; yet it was of great significance because it dramatized in a very clear way both to the West Texas Conference and to the Church in general the spiritual needs of the Spanishspeaking people in Texas and the needs of the Spanish-speaking world south of the border." Additionally, Hernández' zealousness for the Gospel inspired others he met to follow in his footsteps. Hernández' evangelistic passion was recognized on his grave marker in Corpus Christi with the following: "The Rev. Alejo Hernandez, zealot buried here, was the founder of Methodist Mission Work among the Mexicans."

Upon his death, church leaders recognized the importance of Hernández' ministry; notices of his death appeared in the Nashville Christian Advocate, the New Orleans Christian Advocate, and the Texas Christian Advocate. Writing in the Texas Christian Advocate, William Headon stated, "The church should erect a monument to mark the spot where now rests the body of the first Mexican missionary of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South." Bishop Keener, who sent Hernández to Mexico, wrote in New Orleans Christian Advocate of Hernández' desire to serve God:

I shall never forget how I was impressed on our first entrance to the conference room, three years ago. His well-knit manly frame, pleasant countenance and brilliant eye, indicated his character. Ingenious as a child, singularly [beginning of page 46] spiritual, and of unusual energy, he was ready for any enterprise in the Master's service to go alone and at an hour's notice, if need be, to the ends of the earth. His conversion had satisfied every early desire, and it only remained for him to spend his life at the feet and in the work of his gracious Saviour. He became in an instant a missionary then and for ever. How full must have been the flood of holy passion in the soul of this young man to diffuse itself, as it has, throughout our church!

These tributes to Alejo Hernández, as well as the support he received from his local church, bishops, and annual conference, demonstrate the trust and appreciation that was given to this pioneer in Methodism. His ministry entailed many travels and many hardships, all of which he faced with confidence in God's power and grace. His conversion to the Protestant faith was coupled with a call to spread the Good News of Jesus Christ. Such faith was admired by his Methodist colleagues and the among the Mexicans and Mexican-Americans who received his message. Hernández' ministry laid a foundation for future ministers, lay and ordained, who would brave the hardships of carrying the Protestant faith into Spanish-speaking communities in the U.S. Southwest and Mexico. His life serves as a shining example of a person who journeyed throughout his life, all the while responding faithfully to God's call.

SECTION IX.

THE FORM AND MANNER OF ORDAIN-ING DEACONS.

When the day appointed by the Bishop is come, after a suitable sermon or exhortation, one of the elders shall present unto the Bishop all them that are to be ordained, and say.

I present unto you these persons present, to be ordained deacons.

Then their names being read aloud, the Bishop shall say unto the people:

Brethren, if there be any of you who knoweth any impediment or crime in any of these persons presented to be ordained deacons, for the which he ought not to be admitted to that office, let him come forth in the name of God, and show what the crime or impediment is.

If any crime or impediment be objected, the Bishop shall surcease from ordaining that person, until such time as the party accused shall be found clear of that crime.

Then shall be read the following Collect. The Collect.

Almighty God, who by thy divine providence hast appointed divers orders of ministers in thy Church, and didst inspire thy apostles to choose into the order of deacons thy first martyr, St. Stephen, with others: mercifully behold these thy servants, now called to the like office and administration: replenish them so with the truth of thy doctrine, and adorn them with innocency of life, that both by word and good example they may faithfully serve thee in this office, to the glory of thy name, and the edification of thy Church, through the merits of our Saviour Jesus Christ, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost, now and forever. Amen.

Then the Bishop, or one of the elders appointed by him, shall read the Epistle.

The Epistle. 1 Tim. iii. 8-13.

Likewise must the deacons be grave, not double-tongued, not given to much wine, not greedy of filthy lucre: holding the mystery of the faith in a pure conscience. And let these also first be proved; then let them use the office of a deacon, being found blameless. Even so must their wives be grave, not slanderers, sober, faithful in all things. Let the deacons be the husbands of one wife, ruling their children and their own houses well. For they that have used the office of a deacon well, purchase to themselves a good degree, and great boldness in the faith which is in Christ Jesus.

Then shall the Bishop examine every one of those who are to be ordained, in the presence of the people, after this manner following:

Do you trust that you are inwardly moved by the Holy Ghost to take upon SEC. 9.] ORDINATION OF DEACONS. 241

you the office of the ministry in the Church of Christ, to serve God for the promoting of his glory and the edifying of his people?

Ans. I trust so.

The Bishop. Do you unfeignedly believe all the canonical Scriptures of the Old and New Testament?

Ans. I do believe them.

The Bishop. Will you diligently rend or expound the same unto the people whom you shall be appointed to serve?

Ans. I will.

The Bishop. It appertaineth to the office of a deacon to assist the elder in Divine service, and especially when he ministereth the holy communion, to help him in the distribution thereof, and to read and expound the Holy Scriptures; to instruct the youth; and in the absence of the elder to baptize.

And, furthermore, it is his office to

search for the sick, poor, and impotent, that they may be visited and relieved. Will you do this gladly and willingly?

Ans. I will do so, by the help of God. The Bishop. Will you apply all your diligence to frame and fashion your own lives (and the lives of your families) according to the doctrine of Christ; and to make (both) yourselves, (and them,) as much as in you lieth, wholesome examples of the flock of Christ?

Ans. I will do so, the Lord being my helper.

The Bishop. Will you reverently obey them to whom the charge and government over you is committed, following with a glad mind and will their godly admonitions?

Ans. I will endeavor so to do, the Lord being my helper.

Then the Bishop, laying his hands severally upon the head of every one of them, shall say,

sit down to meat, and will come forth and serve them. And if he shall come in the second watch, or come in the third watch, and find them so, blessed are those servants.

Immediately before the benediction shall be said these Collects following :

Almighty God, giver of all good things, who of thy great goodness hast vouchsafed to accept and take these thy servants into the office of deacons in thy Church : make them, we beseech thee, O Lord, to be modest, humble, and constant in their ministration, and to have a ready will to observe all spiritual discipline; that they having always the testimony of a good conscience, and continuing ever stable and strong in thy Son Christ, may so well behave themselves in this inferior office, that they may be found worthy. to be called unto the higher ministries in

Take thou authority to execute the office of a deacon in the Church of God; in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

Then shall the Bishop deliver to every one of them the Holy Bible, saying,

Take thou authority to read the Holy Scriptures in the Church of God, and to preach the same.

Then one of them appointed by the Bishop shall read the Gospel.

The Gospel. Luke zii. 35-38.

Let your loins be girded about, and your lights burning, and ye yourselves like unto men that wait for their lord, when he will return from the wedding, that when he cometh and knocketh, they may open unto him immediately. Blessed are those servants whom the lord when he cometh shall find watching. Verily I say unto you, that he shall gird himself and make them to

thy Church, through the same thy Son our Saviour Jesus Christ; to whom be glory and honor, world without end. *Amen*.

Prevent us, O Lord, in all our doings, with thy most gracious favor, and further us with thy continual help; that in all our works, begun, continued, and ended in thee, we may glorify thy holy name, and finally, by thy mercy, obtain everlasting life, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Benediction.

The peace of God, which passeth all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in the knowledge and love of God, and of his Son Jesus Christ our Lord; and the blessing of God Almighty, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, be among you, and remain with you always. *Amen.*
